

The **18th Amendment** banned the manufacture, sale, or transportation of intoxicating liquors in the United States. It was ratified on January 16, 1919.

The **21st Amendment** repealed (or canceled out) the 18th Amendment and was ratified on December 5, 1933.

Wayne Wheeler was the chief strategist behind getting the 18th Amendment ratified. He worked for the Anti-Saloon League (ASL).

Congressman Andrew Volstead was the sponsor of the National Prohibition Act, which was known as the Volstead Act. This act determined how the 18th Amendment would be enforced.




